






# This Is Our Time

Everything changes; time, yourself, your surroundings and the style of clothing that is "in." Remember that part of you which you have left behind.






# I've Got So Much Work To Do





Presented December 2nd and 3rd, the play follows the everyday lives of the Gibbs, and Webb families, telling of their fears and hopes, dreams and loves.

The stage manager, portrayed by Jim Gibbs, follows the story from the spectator's view, offering advice, opinion, philosophy, and guidance. He leads Emily (Liz Peebles) and George (Mike Calhoun) through love, marriage, and death. He points out to the audience the obvious and the discreet, the humorous and the sad. This play reflects life, on earth and beyond.

The Stage Manager (Jim Gibbs) tells his opinion about married life "M marries N, millions of them. The cottage, the go-cart, the Sunday afternoon drives in the Ford, the first rheumatism, the grandchildren, the second rheumatism, the deathbed, the reading of the will — once in a thousand times it's interesting!"






# Marching Band Establishes National Reputation




# Washington Opens Its









# The Trocks Are Coming



January 26th, 1978, was absolutely the last straw. An extremely severe blizzard struck with such force that virtually everything was closed, shut down or turned off, including the heating in many people's homes.

However, all good (and bad) things must end sometime, and it was with great relief that we saw the last snow drifts melt, the grass start to appear, and finally the sun come out.

Many things will be forgotten from year to year, but the winter of '77-'78 and its memories will never totally fade from sight.










# Revere Loses Heartbreakers




The team was optimistic about winning throughout the season and agreed that they should have won the four games that were lost.






# There Were The Winners And The Losers









# Baseball Team Keeps Pitching









# Girls Do It for the First Time













Beginning in March Student Congress met weekly, and the "politicians" discussed, debated and passed issues and bills of current interest. Student Congress continued through June.






# Versatility Shines In The Class Of '79


# These Are Our Years


## The Board States Its Philosophy
